In recent days, Parent/Teacher Night is considered



Science/Agriculture Report - Griffith Site

Science and Agriculture have been running around like headless chickens with all the activities that have been going on this term!

Year 7 Discovery

Year 7 have been looking at states of matter and how that applies to our beautiful planet. They have completed a Practical Assessment task that required them to look at the different states of matter of water. This helped them understand various scientific skills, including the favourite - lighting a bunsen burner!

Year 8

This term we have been looking at different types of forces and energy, as well as investigating what appliances are more energy efficient. This has helped us understand how we can play our part in saving energy which in turn makes us more environmentally friendly. We also got to have some fun with a Van Der Graaf generator! The students have also been working on their Student Research Projects. This is the major assessment for Stage 4. The students are required to develop their own experiment based on their interests. We are all looking forward to seeing what they have discovered.

Year 9

We ended last term looking at the Nuclear World around us. Did you know that flight attendants are bombarded with more radiation per year than scientists working in a Nuclear Reactor? We also looked closely at the handful of Nuclear disasters and whether nuclear power is a beneficial energy source in the future. This term we started with electricity. We looked at series and parallel circuits, as well as all the safety concerns and precautions that scientists have solved. We also looked at whether electricity can kill you and why some people survive a lightning strike. We are now looking at waves, including light and sound. We now understand how we can communicate in space, as well as how we use the electromagnetic spectrum to understand what different stars are made of and listened to what space sounds like.

Year 10

Last term we finished off our Student Research Projects. There were so many exciting and fresh ideas. We held a presentation night which was a hit! It was an excellent night for the students to show off all their hard work. This term, we started looking at genes and how they determine who we are. We also looked

at technology that has helped us to allow or assist reproduction in various ways. We are now investigating how life began. This is a favourite topic amongst staff and students as they not only get to analyse various bits of evidence, they also learn life-long skills like debating an idea and not ridiculing the person.



Passion Electives

The Great Outdoors Group have been growing and harvesting spinach on the basis of our Hydroponic System in use at the School Farm. The Spinach leaves are then used in the canteen for our students' lunches. This will become an Aquaponic System in Term 4 when we introduce yabbies into the system.

Junior Agriculture

In Week 8, we were lucky to have people from CQ University come and speak to us thanks to the SISP program. They showed us how to measure sugar levels in fruit using refractometers and new technology using GPS collars on animals so that farmers can check on their livestock on an iPad instead of spending half a day riding around checking on them.

Senior Agriculture

Our first attempt in the NSW Stud Merinos Wether Trial was an absolute success. Our senior Agriculture students were given the opportunity to: handle livestock, halter and lead sheep, regular weigh them, worm testing, nutritional needs and general showing. We thank the Deniliquin Show Society and AWI for assisting us with this learning experience. Our senior Ag students are keen as mustard to improve in their results in 2020.

Mr Chirgwin's Primary Industries class marked our 9 male and 5 female lambs halfway through the term. Even Lincoln, the poddy lamb, was in the cradle. Let's just say that there were a few sore woolly bodies the next day.

Science/Agriculture Report - Wade Site

It's been fairly hectic at the Wade Site this term in Science and Ag. Year 10 are completing their VAL-ID test at the moment to enable us to gather some data on their strengths and weaknesses in Science. Year 9 have been working on constructing an earth-quake tower and have had a lot of fun testing it to see how well they have planned and constructed it.

National Science Week was extremely well organized by Mrs Moon. Activities included Classic Scientific movies, a quiz during learning coach lessons, Crystal growing, STEM activities and various science teachers parading around in Lab Coats. Huge thanks to Mrs Moon for her hard work.

This week we have had a visit from the Uni of Queensland for a STEM day where they conducted some interesting hands on activities. Students from our feeder schools participated on the first day and a group from Year 7 and 8 participated on the second day. They had a go at using GPS units to simulate tracking livestock in a grazing system and also looked at applications of science in food. By all reports students had a great time and represented Murrumbidgee Regional High School in a positive and enthusiastic manner.

Agriculture and Primary Industries have had a busy time of late. Students who participated in the National Merino challenge went to Deniliquin during August for the showing stage of the competition. Students had to lead the sheep and assist in shearing, wool handling and assessment of carcase quality. Both the Griffith and Wade Site attended and competed well against some impressive schools.

Senior classes are tidying up loose ends before they finish their respective courses. We would like to take this opportunity to wish Year 11 all the best for their exams over the next 2 weeks and Year 12 all the best in their HSC exams next term.






Maggie Fry – The Human Paradox. Maggie utilised her skills using technology to create a series of photographs reflecting the alter egos of her family members.


